Hawaii Soto Mission Association Spring Meeting Report

Sunday, February 25

The Hawaii Soto Mission Association's Spring Meeting was held at Nuuanu Soto Mission / Betsuin on Sunday, February 25, 2024. Reverend Hirasawa was present along with Mantokuji delegates Eric Moto and Cathy Murayama. The meeting was called to order at 10:25 am following a morning service. On the agenda:

- Treasurer's report by Thomas Itagaki showed a healthy amount of net assets as of 12/31/2023.
- Revisions to HSMA's Policy Guidelines and By-Laws discussed at the 2023 Fall Meeting were to be voted on at this meeting; however, the revised documents were not completed by the Executive Board and will be presented at a later meeting.
- The Board was able to address treasurer Itagaki's long-standing retirement request with the nomination and election of Glenn Tango as the new treasurer.
- Treasurer Tango will revive stalled efforts to develop a Retirement Fund Program for ministers. Kauai Zenshuji minister, Reverend Scott Mangis, reported a background in financial planning and offered to work with treasurer Tango on the Retirement Program.
- It was reported that \$5000 in donations was collected for Maui wildfire relief and the Hawaii Buddhist Council will divide the money equally for each of the three destroyed Lahaina Buddhist temples.
- Reverend Jiko Nakade from Kona Daifukuji proposed a new program for possible HSMA support. Rev. Nakade's online
 Dharma educational program targeting children within the preschool to about 3rd grade range is based on her "The Sunday
 Sangha" program for children and is tentatively called "Dharma Keiki." Rev. Nakade also announced plans for a threemonth long online study session focusing on the Soto Zen Buddhist precepts beginning in June.
- Reverend Shuji Komagata presented his ambitious ideas for the 10th U.S. Soto Conference to be hosted by HSMA on October 23 26, 2025. The conference planning committee will be putting together a variety of interesting and informative work/study sessions in hopes of attracting 300 to 400 participants.
- Finally, the 57th Annual UHSSWA Conference at Hilo Taishoji on April 27 & 28 was announced, along with the 2024 Fall HSMA Meeting in October also at Hilo Taishoji. The meeting adjourned at 12:25 pm.

Climate Change Toolkit Workday – Site Visit from Adam Klein (FEMA) – Site Visit from Senator Lynn DeCoite

Friday, February 23

Friday, February 23 was a very busy day at the temple. It was not only another day of Bazaar preparation work for our temple volunteers, but it was also an important Climate Change Toolkit workday for student interns: Dyther Bugtong, Samuel Dameg, Llyw MacMillan, Noah Munz, and Peyten Tokishi and their Oceanit mentors: Mike Foley, James Yehambaram, Dylan Kobayashi, and Louise Currie. From 8:00 am until 3:30 pm, under the supervision and guidance of their mentors, the interns collected sand and water samples, made drone video recordings of the study area, launched coconuts to observe ocean currents, setup video cameras along the shoreline, and conducted video interviews. Our guests were treated to a delicious lunch prepared by our Fujinkai kitchen crew. Mantokuji is grateful for everyone involved in the Climate Change Toolkit work that day and we know that their month's long efforts with this project will result in a vital collection of scientific data needed in future beach restoration and shoreline erosion mitigation efforts. Mantokuji will also greatly benefit from the community interaction and the opportunity to help others learn about the significance of our long spiritual and cultural history in Paia.

Another important part of the workday was a 9:00 am site visit from FEMA representative Adam Klein who is with the Department of Interior's Natural and Cultural Resources Recovery Support Functions. His focus is on environmental issues that are a part of disaster recovery. Mr. Klein's visit follows a site visit from other FEMA representatives earlier this year. Mike Foley and Eric Moto offered a brief history of Mantokuji at the Mantokuji Bay site, talked of Mantokuji's spiritual and cultural connections to Paia, reviewed the temple's efforts to address the ongoing shoreline erosion challenges, and outlined current projects and plans associated with beach restoration proposals. Mr. Klein spoke of possible grant funds available through FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP). A two-page letter outlining Mantokuji's project proposals can be submitted by June for FEMA to consider whether Mantokuji is eligible for HMGP funds. Mike Foley and Mr. Klein will maintain follow-up communication on this matter.

And Mantokuji was pleased to welcome one more important visitor during our busy workday. At 11:30 am State Senator Lynn DeCoite arrived for a site visit. She was impressed by the data collection work of the Oceanit mentors and interns, and she learned how the information resulting from the current project would benefit future beach restoration plans. Sen. DeCoite spoke of her long-time interest in our temple bay and even shared that our beach area is sometimes her getaway spot for a quiet lunch break. Sen. DeCoite mentioned that as the legislative chair of Economic Development and Tourism she sees how our erosion mitigation and beach restoration efforts tie into "regenerative tourism" and that the approaches that Mantokuji and Oceanit have adopted also tie into current preferences for "nature-based solutions" that are "climate resilient." Sen. DeCoite and Mike Foley also agreed to maintain follow-up communications on possible future legislative proposals for project funding.
