Happy New Year! Akemashite Omedetougozaimasu!

At the beginning of this year, I would like to introduce this word, "誓願". It is read as "Seigan," meaning "vow" and "wish". It is a vow made by a Buddha or Bodhisattva to salvage all people. It also means to make a vow to oneself and hope that it will be fulfilled.

What is your "vow" and "wish" this year? It is said that when you are trying to achieve a big wish, it is better to achieve small goals little by little. My "vow" and "wish" for this year is to be healthier than last year. So I will try to achieve my smaller goals by walking to the post office in Paia instead of using a car. Let's all achieve our "vow" and "wish" step by step.

The New Year Blessing service will be held at Mantokuji Temple on Sunday, January 7. Let's pray for getting rid of suffering and welcoming happiness. You can get new Ofuda and Omamori at the service. And if you have old Ofuda or Omamori, please bring them with you as we will perform the Ofudayaki service and burn them.

This is the year of the Dragon, the fifth of the twelve animal signs of the Chinese zodiac. People born in the Year of the Dragon are those born in 1916, 1928, 1940, 1952, 1964, 1976, 1988, 2000, and 2012. In terms of personality, people born in the Year of the Dragon are visionary and ahead of others. They do not talk much, but they have big dreams. They often go their own way at their own pace and are often thought of as elusive.

Actually, I was born in the Year of the Dragon, and I am often told that I am a person who goes at my own pace. Yes, it is true.

Jodo-e (Bodhi Day) Service

Held on Sunday, December 3, 2023

Jodo-e is the day of Enlightenment for Siddharta Gautama who became Shakyamuni Buddha on this day, December 8, about 2600 years ago. Perhaps it is the most important in Buddhism as it marks the beginnings of Buddhism as we have today.

An excerpt from Rev. Hirasawa's sermon after the Jodo-e Service:

"Today we celebrated Buddha's enlightenment together. Some of you may have felt enlightenment is a special thing that only a great person like the Buddha could attain. But as I told you today, Soto Zen teaches that we too can become like the Buddha by leaving behind our ego, including our everyday worries and emotions, and face what is in front of us straight on. It also teaches that it is not something we can acquire in our hands, but that it is meaningful to keep practicing it constantly. Even if you cannot come to zazen, remember this, and try to do each of your daily activities with a careful and clear mind. You will surely be able to spend your time with a peaceful mind."

Shichi-Go-San Ceremony

Held on Sunday, November 19, 2023

The Shichi-Go-San Ceremony was held on Sunday, November 19th. Fifth grader Matthew Matoi opened the ceremony playing Vandana Ti-Sarana on the piano as Rev. Hirasawa and sangha sang. Upon the conclusion of the ceremony Rev. Hirasawa blessed Nicholas Matoi who turned 7 years in September and his family wrote on an emma (wooden plaque) with their wishes for a long, healthy life. He was then gifted with a bag of sweets (chitose-ame) as is the traditional custom.

Please bring your old omamori, o-fuda, and other burnable altar objects to the temple before January 7 or on the morning of the service. Please remove all metal and plastic before putting the items to be burned in the container labeled "For O-fuda Yaki Service" on the office lanai. Omamori will be sold after the New Year's Blessing Service in the social hall. The cost is \$5 each.
