# Reverend's Message

Hello Everyone.

The Obon season in Hawaii has started! Many of you may visit various temples each week to enjoy the dances, taiko performances, and specialty foods. Mantokuji's Obon this year will begin on July 12th with a service at 6:00 p.m. Then on the 13th, there will be a graveyard service at 3 p.m., food concessions will open at 5:30 p.m., taiko performances at 6 p.m., and dancing will begin at 7 p.m.

The service performed during Obon is called Daisejiki-e service, which is one of the Buddhist practices of offering food for hungry ghosts who wander through a world called "Gakido (Preta)." By offering food to all the lonely spirits who have no one to welcome them, we learn the heart of sharing which is called Fuse (Dana) in Buddhism. The merit generated by the practice is meant to be given back to our ancestors and dear family members who return during the Obon for their eternal peace. The Daisejiki-e is a very important service for us in which we learn the heart of Fuse and offer our gratitude and compassion to our loved ones.

This year, we are pleased to welcome Rev. Jigaku Takenouchi from Taishoji Temple in Hilo as our guest speaker for the service. He is the successor to Rev. Hata who came to Mantokuji's obon for many years until he returned to Japan. Please join us for Rev. Takenouchi's first obon service at Mantokji.

Obon is made possible by the many volunteer workers. We appreciate any and all help. So, if you have time, please join us to make the Obon Festival at Mantokuji a success. I look forward to seeing you at Mantokuji very soon.

### Memorial Day & Eitaikuyo Service

Sunday, May 26, 2024

Paia Mantokuji welcomed 15 attendees to their Memorial Day/Eitaikuyo Service on Sunday, May 26, 2024. We honored the lives of those who have passed away in past wars in history and present wars of today. Reverend Hirasawa shared that we are here to pray for peace, understanding, and compassion in the world and the end to all this needless fighting. We are also here to remember our loved ones who have passed on and especially those who have no one left to pray for them.

He also believes that it is important that we not only pray for the deceased and victims of war but think of ways we can contribute to the prevention of unnecessary aggression and violence and pursue ways we can promote peace.



After the service in the temple, we all gathered at the War Memorial outside to honor and pray for the fallen soldiers. Feelings of thankfulness for the life we have today because of their sacrifices filled the air.

## Mantokuji's Cemetery Headstones Cleaned and Catalogued

A BIG MAHALO to **Chaysen Hiromasa Tanaka**, son of members Scott and Kim Tanaka, for choosing to clean and catalogue Mantokuji's Cemetery headstones for his Eagle Scout Project. This was a task Reverend Hirasawa and wife Yuki had been working on before Chaysen took on the work through his Eagle Scout Project. He coordinated and led 35 people (scouts, other youth, Boy Scouts of America adult volunteers and family and friends) to assist him with his Eagle Scout Project.



To complete his project of cleaning, documenting and mapping 530 graves, Chaysen met with Mantokuji leaders, planned the execution of the project, solicited donation of materials, and made sure that all volunteers were safe while working on cleaning the gravestones. Another important aspect of the project



Chaysen included was a blessing by Reverend Hirasawa before the project began. He worked closely with the temple to be sure all work was done with reverence and respect.
