REVEREND'S MESSAGE

Aloha, everyone.

It is getting hotter by the day. The rain is less frequent and the days are getting longer. Summer is here!

I would like to share my experience at the UHSSWA conference hosted by Aiea Taiheiji on Oahu on April 26-27. This was my third in-person UHSSWA conference. It was inspiring to see participants from each temple pray together, exchange goods at the country store, and learn about the activities of each temple. We also enjoyed the opportunity to deepen our fellowship with members and ministers from other temples. At the banquet and luncheon, Okusan, Ruri and I sat at the same table with Rev.Yoshida, Rev. Fukagawa and their wives who had also brought their children with them. It was fun getting to know and interact with their children and it was also a good opportunity for our families to exchange our thoughts and information about parenting.

At the Dharma session, we learned "Baika" with Rev. and Mrs. Ishii as instructors. Baika was founded in 1952 to promote the teachings of Soto Zen Buddhism. It is an activity to learn and practice the teachings of Shakyamuni Buddha and the two founders of Soto Zen Buddhism, Dogen Zenji and Keizan Zenji, through the singing of Go-Eika and Go-Wasan. It was a wonderful session, with everyone chanting the Baika together, and I felt we were all united, which exemplified the theme of the conference, Isshin: One Heart, One Mind, One Path.

Mantokuji used to have a Baika club that practiced this activity, but it has been inactive for a while. We recently had the opportunity to hold a workshop on Zoom and practice Baika. I started learning Baika after I came to Hawaii, so I am not a very good teacher yet and I am not a very good singer either, but if you like Japanese waka and singing, we can study together. Please let me know if you are interested in joining our baika group.

Now, O-Bon season is coming up on July 11 and 12. Please feel free to contact me if you have time to help us prepare for this big event or have any questions about the O-Bon services, Toba, Tanagyo, or the Bon dance.

APRIL 26-27, 2025, HOSTED BY SOTO MISSION OF AIEA TAIHEIJI

Saturday began with a bento lunch in the social hall. It was followed by the

Opening Service and Memorial Service and the General Membership meeting in

the temple. Next was picture taking and the always anticipated Country Store. Each unit brought their signature items for sale . . . SPECIAL O-BON

TOBA, TANAGYO AND MEMORIAL RIBBON REQUESTS

Buddhists remember their departed loved ones and family ancestors during the O-Bon season. Prayers and toba (memorial tablets) are also offered in their memory during the O-Bon Service which will be held on Friday, July 11th at 6:00pm. At the O-Bon Service, Reverend Hirasawa will chant the toba memorial dedications and the merit dedications to the deceased.

If you would like to offer toba to family members who have passed away, and especially for those who are having their first O-Bon or Hatsubon, please send in the Toba Request Form enclosed by June 23rd.

This year, we are again adding the option to honor your departed loved ones. Like the chochins hung outside during O-Bon with memorial ribbons hanging from them, we will hang chochin in the temple to give others an opportunity to pay tribute and honor their departed loved ones with a Memorial Ribbon hanging from a chochin. On Sunday after the O-Bon Festival, we will dismantle the chochin in the temple and remove the Memorial Ribbons. These Memorial Ribbons will be burned in a ceremonial fire. **Please fill in your Memorial Ribbon requests on the form and send in by June 23**rd.

During O-Bon time, families may wish to hold a service in their homes to honor their deceased family members. This is a special opportunity for families to gather and remember deceased loved ones. If you would like to request an O-Bon House Visitation (Tanagyo), please fill out the bottom of the Toba Request Form with the date and time you would like Reverend Hirasawa to do your tanagyo. He will confirm date and time with you.
