REVEREND'S MESSAGE

Aloha everyone,

It's November and the mornings and evenings are getting cooler and more comfortable. Thank you to everyone who participated in the Daruma-ki Service and the picnic. Hosting this annual picnic is Mantokuji's thank you for all your help throughout the year. We were happy to be able to spend a pleasant time together with fun games and good food and we look forward to seeing more of you at Mantokuji Temple in the future!

On November 16, we will have the Shichi-Go-San service. Shichi-Go-San, which means 7, 5, 3 in Japanese, is a traditional Japanese custom to celebrate the growth of children at the ages of 3, 5, and 7. Shichigosan is a celebration to thank parents for the safe growth of their children and to pray for the healthy growth of their children in the future. This custom was started at a time when medical care was not fully developed and children often became ill. However, even today with the development of medical care, this custom remains because of the unchanging love of parents for their children.

The origin of this ceremony is that it celebrated the age of 3 years old when children begin to grow their hair, which had been shaved before. Where I grew up, 3 years old was a celebration for girls, but there are also communities that celebrate both boys and girls at age 3. Celebrating a boy's fifth year was important as a milestone where boys wore "hakama" for the first time and were recognized as members of the community. A celebration for a girl turning seven marked the transition from wearing simple children's obi or ties to wearing a formal obi like an adult. Today, children celebrate in any type of clothing.

At this Shichi-Go-San service, we express gratitude to the Buddha and ancestors for the safe growth of your child and pray for their continued protection. Families with children turning three, five, or seven years old who would like to participate in this service, please contact me at your earliest convenience. Thank you.

KYODAN MEETING REPORT

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 14, 2025

Below are some of the topics that were discussed at the meeting.

- Shoreline Erosion Project is in the process of requesting a permit extension of existing structure and an extension of the structure. Contractor CMAC proposal for the repair and extension - \$389K.
- Received \$500K from County grant & \$250K from a state Grant in Aid grant (Oceanit Research Foundation)
- Fuel Tank/Line clean-up it was determined that the tank is filled with dirty sea water. Water will be removed and filled with grout. Decided against removing tank as the ground will become unstable.
- Notified by Mutual Underwriters that our insurance carrier Coaction Specialty Insurance Group requires an update to the electrical box. Electrical Connection was hired to replace the electrical panel (\$3,250) and to revamp the meter (\$5,735).

- The O-Bon Service (July 11) and Festival (July 12) were very successful. The hondo was filled with families of Hatsubon and sangha members. Concession netted \$20K.
- Scout Brennan Tanaka is doing an Eagle Scout Project to provide a directory of the cemetery.
- Jen & Dan Marshall donated the repair of the minister's residence bathroom.
- Extension application for Reverend Hirasawa and Yuki Hirasawa's R-1 VISA has been filed by attorney KahBo Dye-Chew.
- Mantokuji will be hosting a Welcome Back dinner for Reverend Kenji and Naoko Oyama on Tuesday, October 28, 2025 at 6:00pm in the social hall. Mantokuji will provide the main dishes and attendees are asked to bring side dishes, pupus or dessert.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

"Pumpkin Crunch makes for the perfect dessert. Layers of pumpkin sitting atop a deliciously moist, but crunchy crust topped with a sweet cream cheese frosting. The ultimate fall dessert." by Relle Lum of Keeping it Relle.



PUMPKIN CRUNCH

Pumpkin Layer

- 1 15 ounce can pumpkin puree
- 1 12 ounce can evaporated milk
- 3 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- ½ teaspoon cinnamon

Crust Layer

- 1 box 15.25oz yellow cake mix
- 1 box 3.4oz Jello-instant vanilla pudding mix
- 1 cup chopped walnuts
- 1 cup butter melted

Frosting Layer

- 1 cup cream cheese
- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 34 cup Cool Whip

- 1. Preheat oven to 350F.
- In a mixing bowl combine pumpkin, evaporated milk, eggs, sugar, cinnamon.
 Mix until well combined.
- Pour into a greased 9x13 pan lined with wax/ parchment paper (don't skip this step).
 Then sprinkle over the top yellow cake mix, vanilla pudding mix, and chopped nuts.
 Spoon over melted butter.
- 4. Bake for 50-60 minutes or until golden brown.
- While pumpkin crunch is baking mix the frosting.
 In a mixing bowl combine cream cheese, powdered sugar, and Cool Whip.
 - Mix until well combined and no lumps are present.
- 6. Once pumpkin crunch has finished baking, remove from the oven and allow to cool completely.
- 7. Once cooled, flip pumpkin crunch so the cake layer is on the bottom and pumpkin on the top.

 Frost with cream cheese topping and ENJOY!
