REVEREND'S MESSAGE

Aloha everyone,

It's already October. The waves hitting the shore at Mantokuji have grown higher, and I can feel the season changing. I returned to Japan again in August to help with the Obon services at my father's temple. I'd like to write about that experience this time. My father's temple is located in Kanagawa Prefecture. The average temperature this August was around 95 degrees Fahrenheit. I clearly remember how hot it was when we arrived at Haneda Airport, even though it was nighttime.

In the area of the temple, it is believed that ancestors return to each home mainly around mid-August. Families specially decorate their home Buddhist altars for their ancestors, and Buddhist minister chant sutras before them. This custom is called "Tanagyo" and is said to have begun approximately 400 years ago. Mantokuji also offers Tanagyo service in our Obon letters, but many families no longer have Buddhist altars, so just a few families currently request this service. However, many families in Japan still hold Tanagyo services. My father and I share the duties, and this year we each visited about 100 homes in five days.

Tanagyo services in Japan is one of the hardest duties for me, but the most painful part is the pain in my legs. This is because most Japanese homes have a Buddhist altar in a tatami room, where I must kneel in seiza position to chant sutras. I also kneel while talking with the family after the sutra is chanted. So by the afternoon of the fifth day, I've lost almost all feeling in my legs. Additionally, some homes do not have air conditioning, or they turn it off to prevent the candle flames from going out, so it is also very hot. I travelled to nearby homes on a motorcycle, so when it rains, it becomes even more difficult. By the time the memorial services are over, I have lost weight.

On Maui, I perform Tanagyo services at a few homes in July, and I like this time because I don't have to sit on the floor, and I can talk with the family without worrying about the time. Next Obon season, I encourage you to hold a Tanagyo service to welcome back your family members. If you're interested, please feel free to contact me.

On October 5th, a Daruma-ki Service will be held at Mantokuji. The Daruma-ki Service

is a Buddhist service commemorating Bodhidharma, the great patriarch of Zen Buddhism. Following the service, we invite everyone who helped in various ways with Mantokuji's Obon festival to join us for a picnic with games and lunch. We look forward to seeing you there.


